RUGBY, THINGS TO DO IN THE CITY AND TOURIST GETAWAYS



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The 2023 Rugby World Cup will take place in France between 8 September and 28 October. The tournament's 48 matches will be played out in nine stadiums, spread among ten host cities (Lille, Lyon, Saint-Étienne, Nice, Marseille, Toulouse, Bordeaux, Nantes, Paris and Saint-Denis) and the 600,000 international visitors expected will be able to enjoy some wonderful socialising, centred around one big, 51-day party.

France is set to host the 10th edition of the Rugby World Cup, exactly 200 years after the sport was invented. For it was in 1823 that William Webb-Ellis, a schoolboy at Rugby School in England, did something that was 'against the rules' of football, by picking up the ball in his hands and running with it.

More than a sporting event, it's a matter of wanting to build an event that is different from the rest. Different in the same way that rugby itself is different: it is a sport that derives its strength from solidarity, sharing, acceptance of differences, self-denial, collective commitment and respect.

The 2023 Rugby World Cup will go beyond the confines of sport. It will resonate at societal level, throughout all the regions and on all the nation's pitches.






The beer getaway

Here's a themed activity that's a cross between a game and an initiation ceremony, to discover the craft beers of northern France while making your way through the charming alleyways of Old Lille. It's a zythological quest that will see you discovering specialist bars, micro-breweries and high-end establishments from the world of craft beer. On this tour, visitors can drink in the ancestral know-how passed down the generations, which is the pride of northerners.



The Bataille de Fromelles Museum

5 matches will take place in Lille during the Rugby World Cup. To mark the occasion, the Bataille de Fromelles Museum invites you to a temporary exhibition on rugby players and their role during the First World War. "The game for which they had been preparing for so many years"; so read a front-page headline from The Timesin 1919, as rugby paid a heavy sacrifice during the great war. The exhibition explores a wide range of themes associated with this painful period and the sport with the oval ball: anecdotes, little snippets from history never told before and indeed biographies of the rugby players who saw action on the field of battle. Guided tour of Lille on tandems

Discover Lille on authentic tandem bicycles (known in French as vélos hollandais, 'Dutch bikes') that are as attractive and flowery as Amsterdam itself. The bike tour takes around two hours and offers some wonderful timeout in which to discover the main sites of Lille and its History, centred around the topic of 'Lille by the seaside'. A cycling guide will accompany you and share some of their favourite spots and hidden gems of the city. The route takes in 10 stages, and between each of them you'll have the benefit of getting some exercise in the open air.

EXTRA TIME

Bierbuik

A Flemish masculine noun meaning Beer-belly. That says it all - or almost... The younger brother of the Auberge du Vert Mont and the Bloempot chose to be located in the heart of Old Lille, at 19 rue Royale. This social hub, with its cool and festive ambience, was the brainchild of chef Florent Ladeyn, together with his cousin Clément Dubrulle, the chef at Vert Mont, and Kevin Rolland, a childhood friend.



The aim is to give people the opportunity to enjoy a

delicious, healthy, locally produced meal both day and night (till midnight or beyond) for ten euros, drink included. Le Bierbuik is a next-generation dining spot, a social hub that's accessible thanks to its stripped-back, approachable cuisine featuring a wood-fire oven. Also on the menu are beers that the three co-owners created themselves. Chefs' beers with original, quirky and ephemeral based on local produce...

Grand Scène

Grand Scène ('Big Stage') is Lille's temple of street-food, located right in the heart of the city. At a site spread over 1600m2 and two floors, the establishment offers an eclectic homegrown menu at an affordable price, has 2 bars and can host up to 800 people, with seating for 400. Scattered around the communal tables are ten restaurants run by chefs from the region and offering top-class cuisine that is a blend

of diversity and locally produced food and wine. French pizzas, mezzes to share, gourmet burgers, vegetarian halloumi hot-dogs, Greek souvlaki, cakes for grown-ups and kids alike...More than a restaurant, it's a centre for lifestyle and culture and has its own performance venue that organises events all year round. There's something to please everyone's pallette and visitors will enjoy a pleasurable dining experience among friends. Ideally situated near rail stations, public transport links and car parks, the establishment is open from Monday to Sunday, except on Sunday evenings.





A FRANK CAMARADERIE

Ideally situated between Lille and Paris, the Hauts-de-France region is known for its buzzing social scene and the warm welcome you'll get from the locals. This is a region where the tempo of life slows, to make way for original activities, taking place in a way that suits everyone's pace, tastes and desires.

Let yourself marvel at an intensely creative cultural offering that is always kept fresh and updated, slow art, sensory tours, new museums and lots of other original artistic initiatives. The region also has 6 magnificent cathedrals and several UNESCO world heritage sites. When it comes to historical tourism, there are numerous sites that bear witness to the events of the First World War; the best-known of them are the Thiepval memorial, the 'Anneau de la Mémoire'

(Ring of Remembrance) and the Sir John Monash Centre.

The region also offers an abundance of ways to get out into the country when there's a break between matches: 5 Regional Natural Parks, 2 Major Sites of France - Baie de Somme, Deux-Caps and soon the Dunes of Flanders, with 200km of coastline and 100,000 hectares of state-owned forests (known as forêts domaniales).

This is a region of fine food and drink and a festive atmosphere, where people enjoy healthy, high-quality food that's lovingly prepared. In 2023, the region is going to become the first region of France to earn the title 'European Gastronomical Region'.

The recipes in Hauts-de-France are flavoursome, generously-portioned and eclectic, with the region's chefs making the most of the variety and character found in produce from the land and sea. The locally-grown produce is exceptionally fresh and tasty: enjoy strong cheeses, award-winning beers, apples and pears from local orchards, carrots from Tilques, cauliflowers from Saint-Omer, beetroots, garlic from Locon, linden honey, chicory buds, maroilles cheese from Thiérache, the keeping cheese tomme au foin, craft beers and a local variety of brioche called gâteau battu.

A region of history, resilience and peace

The Hauts-de-France is a region that hands down universal values of peace through the sharing of remembrance and the expression of a brotherhood that knows no bounds or borders. The French language itself was officially instituted here, in Villers-Cotterêts, back in 1539. From châteaux to palaces, from cathedrals to belfries, from Art Déco to the Flemish style, some beautiful and remarkable discoveries await those who take the time to come and admire them. The charm of the region is also to be found in meeting new people, enjoying shared occasions and discovering the festivities at one of the braderies (flea markets combined with live entertainment and food stalls), réderies (also a flea market, otherwise known as a vide grenier - literally an 'attic emptier') or other carnivals.



Food tour of Lyon

To enjoy the different areas of the city from a culinary perspective, the Food Tours Lyonnais is a mix of tastings to savour and opportunities to meet dedicated producers and chefs over some local specialities. At Les Halles Paul Bocuse, a shrine to Lyonnaise gastronomy, visitors head out to explore Lyon's produce, amid an array of aromas, flavours and mouth-watering food stands. Try some Saint-Marcellin cheese, Rosette de Lyon cured sausage, a meat pie called pâté en croûte or a tarte à la praline (praline tart) to understand the passion of Lyon's best food producers and find out their food production secrets. For foodies who also like a bit of exercise along the way, these food tours can be done by electric bike, too, so that you combine panoramic views from the hills, strolls beside the waterfront and tasting breaks along the length of the route.

Lyon, 2000 years of history

A UNESCO World Heritage site, Lyon has more than 2000 years of history to discover and offers a remarkable amount of diversity. The styles and buildings on show attest to the different eras the city has gone through: the ruins of Lugdunum and Roman theatres, Renaissance alleyways and houses in Vieux-Lyon (the Old Town), and the 19th century mansions of the prestigious Presqu'île (Peninsula). Lyon is a particularly good place to explore on foot, on a walking tour led by a guide and lecturer, who will be passionate about showing you the rich architectural and historic delights of the city they call home. During the tour, you'll wend your way down the traboules (short passages between two streets) to discover architectural details that will really knock you for six. For a full immersion in Lyon's culture, a trip to some of the 24 museums that retrace the city's history is an absolute must. The Musée Lumière, for instance, explores the lives of the Lumière brothers, who invented the cinema and hailed from Lyon.



Lyon from the water

The charm of the city really makes itself felt when you're on the riverbank. Lyon has both the Saône and the Rhône running through its heart, with the two rivers converging in the district known as Confluence. River cruises on electrically-powered boats offer a different and unexpected perspective on the city's cultural wealth, far from the hubbub of the big streets in the city-centre. For a romantic dinner on the water, the bateau-restaurant Hermès offers up-market cuisine using fresh, seasonable produce. The most sporty visitors can rent a canoe or paddle-board to take in that special light that you get along the riverbanks.

Saint-Étienne is best explored through workshop experiences: head for the Design Cabin in the heart of the Design City, open to children and adults alike who want to have a go themselves. For those with a real appetite, head to the Weiss Workshops, the place to get Haut Chocolat® since 1882. At these workshops, everyone can become a master chocolatier by designing their own bar of design chocolate. And on the refreshment front, Benjamin and Pierre-Luc, two friends with a passion for making beer, have created the Brasserie Stéphanoise.

There you'll discover high-quality products, short distribution cycles and local partners: a fine blend of values. To top off your trip and understand the stéphanois mindset, spend some time with one of the city's 'greeters' during a stroll around the city or out in the country - a fun time awaits you.

The genius of Le Corbusier

A 'city within a city', this is the mad brainchild of the visionary architect Le Corbusier. A stone's throw from Saint-Étienne, the Le Corbusier site in the middle of Firminy-vert has some treats in store for both connoisseurs and the curious: a Housing Unit with multicoloured streets, an unusual cone-shaped church, a UNESCO-listed concave House of Culture, an amphitheatrestyle stadium and a swimming pool. The diversity of Le Corbusier in all its grandeur: here, there's an anecdote to be told on every corner. For instance, this site is his second-biggest creation in the world!

More astonishing still: the windows of the House of Culture are musical. Come and take a look around for a lesson in creativity.

Once you're back in Saint-Étienne, make sure you go on a tour of the city, taking in the Mining Museum, the Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art, the Art & Industry Museum or the Museum of 'Les Verts' inside the Geoffroy-Guichard Stadium.

Saint-Étienne, a city with sport coursing through its veins, is delighted to be meeting the champions: Australia!







Stunning nature just a stone's throw from the city

10 minutes from Saint-Étienne's city-centre, discover 700 square kilometres of mountains and forests: the Pilat. Enjoy a change of scenery on the highest summit of this regional Natural Park, which stands 1400 metres tall. There's no shortage of activities to try: snow-shoes, cani-rando (taking a walk while tethered to a dog) or off road scooters, and, for the most adventurous types, a via ferrata climbing route or some paragliding. The centuries-old stones of the medieval château of Rochetaillée play host to visitors taking a break from a walk or cycle-ride. The walk to the Gouffre d'Enfer will reveal plenty of natural beauty - this is where the Stéphanois go for their Sunday strolls... The Pilat also serves as the backdrop for one of the Most Beautiful Villages in France: Sainte-Croix-en-Jarez, a former monastery dating from the 14th century that is now a village. It welcomes visitors and families amid a friendly, neighbourly atmosphere, in the midst of a historic site that is well worth making a detour to. → More info

EXTRA TIME

La Fabuleuse Cantine

La Fabuleuse Cantine is a place that captures the essence of Saint-Étienne, in one of the city's must-see locations. It's worth taking a detour to this restaurant: situated in the heart of the creative district, its walls once housed a room that was part of the Munitions Factory of Saint-Étienne, and that is now the Design City. It's a building that is taking on new life and a unique backdrop in which to enjoy a meal that will also take you off the beaten track. Salvaged from food waste, the ingredients cooked here are transformed, given new life and beautifully set off by a creative style of cooking which, to top it all off, is organic! And the best time to go? When there's an evening concert on, or one of the other events that are frequently held here!

Les Halles Mazerat

Les Halles Mazerat, first opened in 1872, were renovated in 2021. Located in the heart of the city, along the length of the tram line, this beautiful, buzzing place is fostering a return to enjoying the rich and varied local produce. Restaurants, bakeries, dining areas, and stalls selling fish, roast meat, cheese and cakes from the region can all be found here, as the stall owners come together to offer a microcosm of the Stéphanois lifestyle. It's the perfect place to get together over a pre-match beer, on the terrace or at a shared table, or to enjoy one of the concerts or shows regularly staged here.





A PASS FROM ONE CHAIN OF MOUNTAINS TO ANOTHER

The Auvergne-Rhône-Alps region offers a wide range of destinations: with the Alps and the Auvergne, the region is a paradise for winter sports and outdoor summer activities such as mountain-biking or hiking. The area has hosted the Olympic Games on three occasions: Chamonix in 1924, Grenoble in 1968 and Albertville in 1992. The way of life fostered here is one that is sociable and open to the natural world: it's all about fresh air and thrilling sensations. Mont Blanc, the 'roof of Europe', dominates the Alps and the countryside, while the volcanos of Auvergne, classed as a UNESCO world heri-

tage site, are stunning both for those who love powerful sensations and those who prefer quiet contemplation. The journey doesn't end there, though: you can also explore the Vallée de la Gastronomie – France® which offers a culinary trek and a whirlwind ride for the senses, from the Beaujolais Wines Route to the Drôme provençale and its lavender aromas. You can also marvel at the towns and villages of the region: Vichy, Evian-les-bains, Pérouges and Annecy are a delight for visitors.





The 1st foodie trail through the Vallée de la Gastronomie – France[®]

The Vallée de la Gastronomie – France® offers a journey to the heart of simple pleasures and the art of living, French style: a remarkable journey for the senses. During this itinerary, the visitor discovers a diverse range of terroirs that attest to the exceptional gastronomic and viticultural heritage of the valleys of the Saône and the Rhône, which lead to the Mediterranean. As you cross the valley, marvel at the scenery of the Beaujolais, a Unesco Global Geopark, with its variety of beautifullypreserved landscapes along the length of the Route des Vins. Then visit Tain-L'Hermitage, south of Lyon, to taste its wine and set off on a long stroll among the vineyards. Finally, an absolute must-do is a stop-off at the Drôme, to eat your fill of delicious local specialities such as Ravioli, Pogne de Romans brioche, Olive Oil from Nyon, Picodon cheese, truffles or lavender. In Valence, stop at the restaurant owned by Anne-Sophie Pic, a chef of international renown with three Michelin stars, to discover her super-creative culinary skills.

A visit to some charming towns and villages

The region unveils the charm of the following towns and villages. For starters, there's Pérouges, a medieval town a few kilometres from Lyon. Looking like something straight out of a movie, it has been awarded the title of Most Beautiful Village of France. In Auvergne, Vichy has some seductive Belle Époque architecture, along with the charms of its thermal springs; the queen of spa towns, it has been classed as a UNESCO world heritage site since 2021. Another spa town to explore: Evian-les-Bains, where you can enjoy the fresh air and typical way of life in the French mountains. The same is true of Annecy, the superb Venice of the Alps: with its historic monuments, canals and famous lake, in and around its alleyways or beneath its medieval arcades, the old city of Annecy invites you to take a wander down the corridors of time.

Get all familiar with Mont Blanc's summit and the volcanoes of Auvergne

Head to the Alps and the Aiguille du Midi - a really high mountain with a cable-car! This unrivalled experience has been around since 1955, and offers a stunning panorama of the highest summits in Europe. If you're feeling really brave, have a go at the Pas dans le Vide[®]: you'll be put in a 2.5m-long glass cage, suspended above a sheer drop of 1000m. To make your visit last a little longer, take the Mont-Blanc Tramway, the highest rack and pinion train in France. For those who love a bit of altitude, head to the massif central and the iconic chain of volcanoes known as Les Puys, a UNESCO world heritage site. In the south of the region, the Pont d'Arc is the spectacular emblem of the ravines of the Ardèche; this specially protected natural space houses the Chauvet grotto, a UNESCO world heritage site since 2014 that is seen as 'Mankind's first great chef-d'oeuvre'. → More info



'Nissarde': a menu bursting with flavour

Savour Nice's authentic cuisine, now firmly a part of the non-material national heritage due to its regional authenticity. To discover the original flavours, you have to go to one of the restaurants with the label Cuisine Nissarde. 

A LUMINOUS OPENING

The Provence-Alpes-Côte d'Azur region is set to play a key role during the Rugby World Cup, with 10 of the 48 matches, including two quarter-finals, taking place here. Over half a million fans are expected to attend, along with hundreds of journalists from 175 countries.

Housing as it does two iconic stadiums - one in Nice-Côte d'Azur and one in Marseille-Provence, the region looks set to provide a stunning backdrop for the 2023 Rugby World Cup. Nice, where the Scotland team will be based, is going to host four matches, with six games being played in Marseille, including two quarter-finals. Located close by one another, the two host cities are connected

to the whole world thanks to their international airports, and offer vast regional public transport networks. The region has a lot to offer fans attending the world cup: first and foremost Toulon, a place where rugby has long been worshipped and the base for the South African team at the tournament. But there's also Aix-en-Provence, with its new ultra-modern campus dedicated to rugby. On the Côte d'Azur, Antibes Juan-les-Pins, a town where sport is king and where water-skiing was invented 90 years ago! Or there's Luberon, in the heart of Provence: a veritable paradise for slow tourism, just a few kilometres from the base camp that will play host to Uruguay.



Mediterranean culture, from field to plate

Whether laid out under a sunny sky or tucked away inside the food halls, the local markets are a real treat for the eves and the taste buds. The most famous ones are in Nice, Embrun, Avignon, Toulon and Saint-Rémy-de-Provence. At the stalls you'll find fresh garden herbs, sun-kissed fruit, freshly-cooked vegetables and cheeses from local farms. Tourton pastry parcels, pissaladières flatbreads and other regional specialities brighten up the apéritifs at happy hour with their aromatic flavours. Not forgetting, of course, the region's wines, which offer a range of prestigious appellations and secret vineyards (known as confidentielles), created with native grape varieties. Rosé was born on this land and Provence dedicates 90% of its production to this iconic pink elixir with all its connotations of summer.

Art old and new under the sun

In the South, art takes pride of place, regardless of the period it comes from. You can go back in time at the Cosquer cave with its wood charcoal paintings that date back over 30,000 years, or by visiting the stone sculptures of the Vallée des Merveilles (Valley of Wonders), which are 5000 years old. The region has inspired and seduced artists since time immemorial: Van Gogh, Picasso, Cézanne, Matisse and Chagall have all been captivated by the incomparable light and infinite colour palette of the scenery here. Vineyards, remarkable gardens and private foundations invite visitors to contemplate works by famous names from the contemporary scene, from Jaume Prensa to Louise Bourgeois. Every year, new works of street art adorn the districts of Nice, Toulon and Marseille, and people pour in from all over the world to admire the Maison de celle qui peint (the Painter's House), by Roquevaire, with its ceramic decorations, or Le Corbusier's Maison du fou (The Madman's House) - a UNESCO world heritage site. → More info



An Indian summer in France

From the Rhône delta to Menton, 835 kilometres of riverbanks offer up intimate bays, secret coves and beaches that look out contemplatively on the deep blue sea. Whether you like simple bathing, free diving or scuba diving, the Mediterranean is a magnificent place for doing some exploring. 

Special emphasis is placed on quality and the local distribution circuit. Touch rugby: one of the owners is none other than Romain Ntamack, the legendary fly-half for Stade Toulouse and France.





J'GO

The menu at J'GO is based on the region's flagship foodstuffs: tarbais beans, pork from the Noir de Bigorre breed of pig, organic lamb from the Pyrenees, farm-reared chicken from Gers, IGP fatty goose liver from Landes, and fruit and veg from the region. The chefs work with fresh products purchased within a circumference of 180km. The modus operandi at J'GO is based on purchasing whole carcasses and fresh vegetables bought at fair prices from a select group of producers, all of which is then prepared in the restaurant by butchers, vegetable specialists and chefs.







UPHEAVALS AND LANDSCAPES

Occitania has a remarkable variety of landscapes: the sea, the mountains, the city and the countryside, and visitors can move from one backdrop to another in just a couple of hours. The best way to explore this loveable region is to do so in slow mode, so that you can take in all the nuances of the landscape and drink in the rich local culture. In Occitania, art of living, sociability and a sense of hospitality are not vain aspirations. The locals are known for their accent, their love of partying and their great sense of humour, and you'll enjoy the beauty around you as much as the local joie de vivre. Occitania is France's leading region in terms of the number of

beaches and ports with the Pavillon Bleu ('Blue Pavilion') label, so you need have no qualms about going for a dip at one of the region's vast beaches. Discover the beauty of the seaside, then fall for the authenticity of the fishing ports and villages. And how about the mountains? In the south are the imposing Pyrenees, at more than 3000 metres above sea level, while in the east and north the magnificent scenery of the Massif central unveils itself, with the Aubrac and the Cévennes, whose peaks stand at between 1000 and 1500 metres above sea level.

Narbonne houses one of the most beautiful covered markets in France: les Halles de Narbonne. With its colours, aromas and fizzing vitality, this market reflects the spirit of the city and its inhabitants. Gilles Belzon's restaurant Chez Bébelle, which you'll find here, is a local institution that's well worth going out of your way to find. The Belzon family, which features three generations of rugby players, has opened a bar and grill where you can dive headlong into a culinary game of rugby, with 'Bébelle' announcing the orders using a megaphone and catching beautifully packed cuts of meat in mid-flight, like a back-row forward. Looking for something more traditional? Head to La Maison Bébelle, located in a former convent opposite Les Halles.





A wonderful journey by train

A great way to visit the region is on one of the trains that cut across it : you'll travel from Toulouse to Collioure, via the Vermeille coast. For those with less time to spare, the train that goes to Narbonne and then on to Collioure is the best option. A highlight is when you change trains at Latour-de-Carol, because this is where you take the Canari, a yellow train specific to this region, which has been circling the mountain peaks for over a hundred years and affords unbeatable views. No words can convey the excitement of this adventure and the beautiful encounters provided by these three hours spent up among the peaks, where the train often passes close to the precipice...






An archipelago in the heart of the Pyrenees

The National Nature Reserve of Néouvielle can be accessed via a winding road; note the startling contrast between the sharp, granite peaks and the gentleness of a bucolic landscape dotted with pines and punctuated by 70 lakes. Visitors immerse themselves in the subtle shades of green and turquoise-blue while strolling amongst mountain pines that grow at altitudes of up to 2600 metres (the highest ones in Europe!). The local fauna is remarkable too: there's the Pyrenean Brook Salamander, a large newt that was around at the time of the dinosaurs can be seen alongside solitary foxes, marmots, and many other species. As you move from one valley to the next, taking the alpine passes, the trail takes you from one refuge to the next as you attempt to conquer the Tour du Néouvielle. A total of 5 guarded refuges thus enable you to walk without heavy equipment for several days, so that you can complete a loop all the way round the Reserve.
