Around 475 | 1600th anniversary of the birth of Clotilde, Queen of the Franks

Born: 475, in Vienne or Lyon

Died: 545 in Tours

Clothilde a.k.a. Saint Clotilda, a Burgundian princess, became queen of the Franks through her marriage to King Clovis I. Her influence was crucial in Clovis's conversion to Christianity, aligning the Frankish kingdom with the Roman Catholic Church. After Clovis's death, Clothilde devoted her life to religious pursuits and charity in Tours. Canonized by the Catholic Church, she is celebrated for her role in the Christianization of the Frankish people.

1225 | Construction of Beauvais Cathedral begins

The <u>Saint-Pierre Cathedral of Beauvais</u>, begun in 1225, is a masterpiece of Gothic architecture. Despite never being completed, it boasts the world's tallest Gothic choir at 48 meters/over 157 feet high. Known for its innovative design and engineering, it faced numerous structural challenges, including the collapse of its tower in 1573. Today, it remains a **symbol of medieval ambition** and architectural brilliance.

June 8, 1625 | 400th anniversary of the Birth of astronomer Jean-Dominique Cassini

Born: 1625, Perinaldo - Italy

Died: 1712, Paris

Jean-Dominique Cassini was an influential Italian-French astronomer and engineer. Celebrated for his significant contributions to astronomy, Cassini is best known for discovering four moons of Saturn and the division in Saturn's rings, now called the Cassini Division. His work at the Paris Observatory, where he served as director, established him as a central figure in the scientific revolution of the 17th century.

January 16, 1675 | 350th anniversary of the birth of Louis de Rouvroy, Duc de Saint-Simon

Born: 1675, Paris **Died**: 1755, Paris

Louis de Rouvroy, Duc de Saint-Simon, was a French diplomat and memoirist. Renowned for his detailed and insightful memoirs, he **chronicled the court of Louis XIV**. His writings provide an invaluable account of the politics, personalities, and daily life at the French court, making him one of the most important historians of his time. Saint-Simon's memoirs remain a crucial primary source for understanding the complexities of early 18th-century France.

July 27, 1675 | 350th anniversary of the death of Henri de La Tour d'Auvergne, Viscount of Turenne, Marshal of France

Born: 1611, Sedan,

Died: 1675, Baden Baden - Germany

Henri de La Tour d'Auvergne, Vicomte de Turenne, was one of France's greatest military commanders. As a Marshal of France, his strategic genius and leadership were instrumental in numerous victories during the Thirty Years' War and the Franco-Dutch War. Turenne's legacy is marked by his ability to achieve success with limited resources and his skill in maneuver warfare.

April 6, 1725 | 300th anniversary of the birth of Pasquale Paoli

Born: 1725, Stretta di Morosaglia - Corsica,

Died: 1807, London

<u>Pasquale Paoli</u> was a Corsican patriot, statesman, and military leader, known as the "Father of the Corsican Nation." He played a crucial role in Corsica's struggle for independence from Genoese and later French rule. As the leader of the Corsican Republic, he implemented democratic reforms, established a constitution, and promoted education and economic development. Paoli's legacy endures as a symbol of Corsican identity and nationalism.

May 19, 1825 | 200th anniversary of the death of Claude-Henri de Rouvroy, comte de Saint-Simon

Born: 1760, Paris **Died**: 1825, Paris

<u>Claude-Henri de Rouvroy, comte de Saint-Simon</u>, was a French political and economic theorist, often regarded as one of the founders of socialism. July 4, 1825 | 200th anniversary of the birth of Hélène Bertaux

<u>Albert Schweitzer</u> was a renowned physician, theologian and Nobel Peace Prize laureate, whose humanitarian work and philosophical writings left an indelible mark on the world. Albert Schweitzer was above all, a true humanitarian. The overarching principle that guided him was 'reverence for life', a philosophy that took him to the jungles of Africa, where he healed many and touched the lives of millions worldwide.

January 20, 1875 | 150th anniversary of the death of Jean-François Millet

Born: 1814, Gruchy, Normandy

Died: 1875, Barbizon

<u>Jean-François Millet</u> is a renowned painter and one of the founders of the <u>Barbizon School</u>. Known for his evocative depictions of peasant life, Millet's works, such as "The Gleaners" and "The Angelus," capture the dignity and hardship of rural labor. Millet's heritage endures,

highlighting his profound influence on the art world and his ability to elevate everyday scenes to universal significance.

February 22, 1875 | 150th anniversary of the death of Camille Corot

1925 | 100th anniversary of the French Open tennis tournament ("Roland-Garros") On May 24, 1925, the Roland Garros tennis tournament was created. Named in honor of French

aviator Roland Garros. Held annually in Paris, Roland-Garros is one of the four Grand Slam tennis tournaments, attracting the world's best players to its clay courts. Known for its rich history and challenging playing surface, Roland-Garros has become one of the most famous events in the world of tennis.

March 12, 1925 | 100th anniversary of the birth of cyclist Louis Bobet

Born: 1925, Saint-Méen-le-Grand, Brittany

Died: 1983, Biarritz

<u>Louis "Louison" Bobet</u> was a French professional road cyclist. He was the first major French racer of the post-war era and the first rider to win the Tour de France three years in a row, from 1953 to 1955.

March 26, 1925 | 100th anniversary of the birth of composer Pierre Boulez

Born: 1925, Montbrison

Died: 2016, Baden Baden - Germany

<u>Pierre Boulez</u> was a revolutionary figure in 20th-century music. Renowned for his avant-garde compositions and influential conducting, Boulez pushed the boundaries of traditional music with his exploration of serialism and electronic music. His legacy as a composer, conductor, and advocate for modern music continues to inspire generations of musicians.

June 3, 1925 | 100th anniversary of the death of astronomer Camille Flammarion

<u>Camille Flammarion</u> was an astronomer who dedicated his life to studying the cosmos and popularizing astronomy. July 1, 1925 | 100th anniversary of the death of composer Erik Satie

<u>Erik Satie</u> was a visionary composer who left an indelible mark on the world of music. Known for his avant-garde compositions like "Gymnopédies" and "Gnossiennes," Satie challenged traditional musical norms with his minimalist style and unique harmonies. July 20, 1925 | 100th anniversary of the birth of psychiatrist and essayist Frantz Fanon

Frantz Fanon was a psychiatrist, philosopher and revolutionary from Martinique whose work profoundly influenced postcolonial studies, critical theory and liberation movements worldwide. Famous for his incisive critique of colonialism and its psychological impact on both the colonized, Fanon's writings, notably "Peau noire, masques blancs" and "Les malheureux de la terre", continue to resonate as an uncompromising plea for decolonization and the quest for human dignity. Fanon's legacy remains a beacon of resistance to oppression and a testament to the ongoing struggle for freedom and equality.

November 27, 1925 | 100th anniversary of the birth of filmmaker Claude Lanzmann

Born: 1925, Paris **Died**: 2018, Paris

<u>Claude Lanzmann</u> was an eminent French writer, journalist and film director best known for his film "Shoah", released in 1985. This monumental film, lasting over nine hours, explores the *Holocaust* through the testimonies of survivors, witnesses and executioners. His rigorous, emotional approach has had a profound impact on documentary filmmaking and has made a significant contribution to the collective memory of the Holocaust. December 23, 1925 | 100th anniversary of the birth of architect Andrée Putman

December 29, 1925 | 100th anniversary of the death of Félix Vallotton

Born: 1865, Lausanne, Switzerland **Died**: 1925, Neuilly-sur-Seine, Paris

Swiss-born painter and printmaker <u>Félix Vallotton</u> revolutionized art with his bold contrasts and innovative woodcuts. His works, such as "Intimités" and "Paysages et intérieurs", reflect his acute understanding of human emotions and modern society. Based in Paris, Vallotton became a central figure in avant-garde circles, challenging artistic norms with his distinctive style.

January 17, 1975 - 50th anniversary of the promulgation of the Veil Law on Abortion

On January 17, 1975, France marked a historic moment with the promulgation of the Veil Law, named after Minister of Health Simone Veil. This landmark legislation decriminalized abortion, granting women the right to choose within the first ten weeks of pregnancy. The passage of the law was a watershed moment in French social policy, sparking intense debates yet ultimately affirming women's reproductive autonomy. Today, the Veil Law stands as a cornerstone of

reproductive rights in France and a symbol of progress towards gender equality, influencing similar legislation worldwide.

April 12, 1975 - 50th anniversary of the death of Joséphine Baker

Born: 1906, St. Louis, Missouri, USA

Died: 1975, Paris

Josephine Baker was an American dancer, singer, actress, and civil rights activist who found fame as an expatriate in Europe and France in particular. Beyond her theatrical success, Baker was a courageous advocate for racial equality, actively supporting the Civil Rights Movement in the United States and participating in the French Resistance during World War II. Her remarkable life, marked by her contributions to the arts and her steadfast commitment to justice, continues to inspire and resonate worldwide.
